## What will I study?

### Year 1

Never has there been a more interesting time to study this subject! The course encourages students to develop a critical awareness of the nature of Government and Politics and to demonstrate rights and responsibilities within society. This will be done through reading, critical reflection of contemporary situations and lots of informed discussion. Students study two modules during their first year:

#### Contemporary Politics of the UK

This unit looks at parties, party systems and pressure groups in the UK as well as electoral systems, parliamentary elections, voting behaviour and party ideology.

#### Contemporary Government of the UK

This unit explores the composition, role and power of the legislative and executive branches of government in the UK as well as the judiciary, constitution, rights of the individual and the EU.

### Year 2

The unit studied in the second year gives students a chance to extend their knowledge and understanding beyond the context of the political system of the UK. Not only, can you learn about Boris Johnson, but also Donald Trump!

Areas covered: -

- Government and Politics in the USA
- the rights and responsibilities of the individual
- ideologies, theories and traditions

**Year 2:** Three 2-hour examinations

## Career Opportunities

This course equips students for a number of career areas as it develops many sought after skills. These include effective communication skills and debating and presenting research.

The course also develops a breadth of critical thinking which enhances personal development and an awareness of global issues.

Some students in the past have gone to Manchester and Royal Holloway universities to continue their studies in Politics. Another student has pursued Politics and International Studies at Warwick university. In previous years, many students have also gone on to study Politics with International Relations at Plymouth and Bristol Universities.

## Entry Requirements

Five Level 4 GCSEs are required for entry into 6<sup>th</sup> Form.

Level 5 pass is required in your chosen, or related, subject.

Some subjects require Level 6; decisions will be based on individual students.

## Hours of study (fortnightly)

9 hours of lesson time  
6 hours independent learning
